

Ironically it comes out just as I am morning the loss of my own sweet father, which broke my heart into a million pieces. Loss is loss. As usual, Mark is charming and through his pain he delivers perspective and hope that goes directly to the soul. You don't have to be sad or even a dog owner (I am not) to resonate with Mark's view of the world and the place that animals hold in it. He presents of world of people and animals sharing the planet that is compelling. It's personal. It has depth and meaning. These books have a kind of magic. They get a hold of your heart and don't let go. Don't miss the opportunity to meet Mark through his canine friends or to invite yourself into his private world of joy and pain in his life with Humphrey. He makes you want to love those who are with you -more and better. But watch out- you might want to get a dog!

I am a devoted dog lover, and this book is clearly written by someone who loved their dog. The story didn't seem to be gathering any kind of momentum, was rather a long apology that became painful

to read. So I put it down about half way through. I hope this book helped the author find closure.

Generally, I steer clear of stories, especially dog stories, that have the potential to be sad or "too traumatic" for me to handle. Even the "Chicken Soup for the Dog Lover" stories can upset me for months to come. Currently, I am dealing with the imminent death of my 18-year-old Plott hound, so I definitely had a degree of trepidation when I ordered "Humphrey Was Here."Humphrey's story was deeply profound and, as hopefully you will soon read, he was taken from this world way ahead of his time. While this could have been a story with a whole lot of blame to go around, Mr Asher spent little time on that (other than blaming himself, which was undeserved, though certainly understandable). Rather, he took his experience and put it to positive use. The relationship that he shared with Humphrey glowed throughout every word. The healing that took place after Humphrey died was a long, arduous process, but the end result was truly remarkable. As a result of having read this book, I feel like I am in a better place to handle Hazel's death. Unlike Mr Asher, I have been granted the "luxury" of knowing that her "time" is going to be here soon. For anyone who has struggled with, or may potentially struggle with, the death of their beloved pet, I heartily recommend this book. Even if you don't have a pet, reading "Humphrey Was Here" will explain what you are missing by not having a pet and may even expand your horizons to consider getting one.

Back in November of 2011, I lost my very best friend of 11 years. I miss him everyday with all of my heart. Little has brought comfort, this book has. To read about how important Humphrey was to his owner who loved him, the greif experienced, the journey that lead to healing has helped in my own journey. This book is a MUST for anyone who has ever loved and lost.
