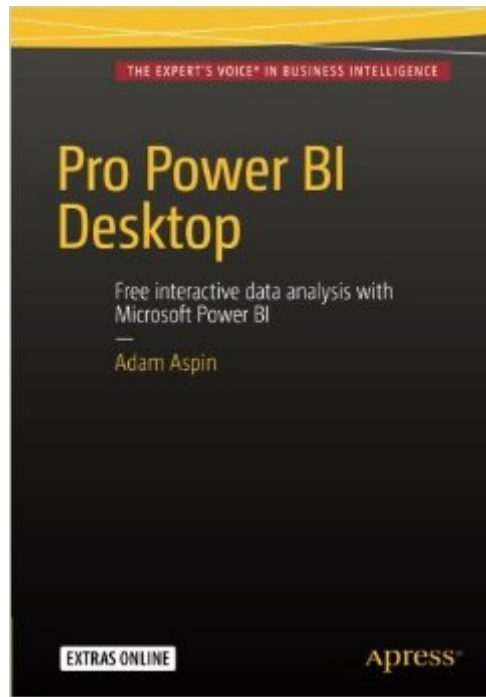


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# Pro Power BI Desktop

Its a big, expensive book - filled with screenshots. If you're looking for something cursary to introduce you to PowerBI then its fine. But this book does not delve into any of the fundamental needs for a PowerBI book - such as DAX coding or avoiding the plethora of pitfalls and working around this evolving product. If you were to watch 4 hours of YouTube videos and spend another 4 playing with PBI desktop and server - you can easilly replicate the material.

I've serval Power BI, DAX, M, etc. books on the shelf. This has become my go to for creating the basic infrastructure of a BI application. While it does not delve into the details of M or DAX it does what it set out to do, explain how to of Power BI Desktop. If I could fault it for something, it would be the light treatment of Visuals, specifically Time Visualization. The section on preparing data for time visualizations is weak. However, I've been finding out so is Power BI in this category. As started this is my go to book at work where I'm building BI applications for my group

Just to let you know where I'm coming from in rating this book 5 stars, I have bought six books on Power BI, DAX and M in my attempt to master the enormous capabilities of Power BI.No single book could possibly cover them all in detail. However this book does a excellent job of giving you a practical way of getting up and running with Power BI.One critic of this book points out that DAX isn't covered in detail but as I mentioned that simply isn't possible if all other aspects are to be covered as well.So although it's not a DAX reference, this book does an excellent job of showing you step by step how to actually use DAX with real-world examples.The same critic also points out that access to SQL Server is required to follow those related examples but for my money just gaining some understanding of the Power BI/SQL Server capability was good enough for me as a starting point.For someone starting off with Power BI or in need of a handy reference on Power BI from 'soup to nuts' this book is my #1 recommendation.If you want to dig deeper into DAX, M or SQL Server then I suggest you also buy one of the many books that covers those topics in detail.I

As a data professional, I was really excited when this book was released because the world of Power BI has changed fairly dramatically over the past couple of years. Adam does a fantastic job of methodically walking through the features and gives examples of how the product works to solve business problems. I particularly enjoyed the examples he put together in each chapter and how each chapter built up on one another so that you could read cover to cover OR jump in somewhere in between. Chapters 2 through 6 can literally take you from no exposure to Power BI to having a fully functional dashboard in a matter of minutes. Chapters 7 through 9 show you how to take the data and develop calculations and context which give the data deeper meaning. Naturally, once you've been shown how to get the data exactly as you need it, the last set of chapters go through visualizations, from basic to completely custom. As I mentioned, I've been working with this tool in its various forms for a couple of years now and I was able to jump in and out of chapters where I was looking for specific troubleshooting information or technical guidance. I did purchase a few additional copies of the book and provided it to some direct reports I have who wanted to learn about Power BI. They worked through it cover to cover and within the same day of starting the book, they had interactive dashboards. Their work only improved as they progressed through the chapters. It is very tough to write about technology that changes as rapidly as this platform, but Adam does a great job here. I recommend this book to anyone looking to complete their understanding of Power BI, whether this is the first time you've heard of it or if you're a more seasoned veteran like myself.

I personally found this a very useful book for getting up to speed with Power BI without the need to front-load technical knowledge first. For sure, as with any book, you could find this information online \*if you knew what you were looking for\* but one of the things I have noticed about management is that one is expected to do more with less time so I don't have time to go down blind alleys. I came at this book from a BI management angle. As an application developer, I like to prototype things so that I can validate as many assumptions as possible before committing to a more robust solution. This is a fairly well-trodden path in the application development world, but seems a rarity in the BI space. Ideally one should be able to trial report designs with real data and verify the feasibility of integrating data before embarking on an ETL odyssey. This type of activity should give sponsors confidence before committing sizeable amounts of capital investment to a BI project. As with the author's previous books the writing style is informal but clear - with all the "ifs" and "buts" included. I

would recommend this as a good book for people who care more about the "what" than the "how".

This book takes you through creating a Power BI report, from loading data to uploading it to the cloud. Each step is gone into in detail over several chapters. The book assumes no prior knowledge of Power BI and minimal knowledge of the Excel plug-ins (PowerPivot, PowerQuery, and PowerView) from which it is derived. The only drawback with the book is that it is loaded with errors; a lot of examples describe one thing but display another; for example, he may give the steps for creating a chart for total sales, but the chart displayed in the illustration is for gross margin. In addition, the description of a basic table is completely wrong; it treats it as a single-value matrix (aggregate data), not as a table with one row for every entry. That said, it is a very worthwhile read and the only comprehensive and comprehensible book on this topic I have found so far.

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
